Bakethin Grazing Project

Four Exmoor ponies; a rare English breed, are grazing a valuable calcareous flush site on the north shore of Bakethin Reservoir. The encroachment of purple moor grass (Molinia caerulea) and common reed (Phragmites communis) as well as shrubs are trees were crowding out the more desirable botanical species such as fragrant orchid (Gymnadenia conopsea) and Marsh lousewort (Pedicularis palustris) that thrive in the damp lime rich conditions. Exmoor ponies have a proven track record for tackling tussocky and scrubby grasslands and are recognised by major environmental bodies as excellent selective grazers, this has been revealed by the grazing project at Bakethin.

We are now into our fifth year of monitoring (since 2005) the effects of grazing and there are positive signs that the site is responding well. The UK standard National Vegetation Classification (NVC) community is now mire habitat, with no NVC woodland or grassland communities. The number of higher plant species has increased from 78 in 2005 to 94 in 2007. There has been a slight dip down to 90 species in 2008 which may be due to only one survey visit compared to two in previous years. The list of sedges has also increased.
